herrice Dorsey-Smith, Acting Director of San Francisco's Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families (DCYF), oversees a \$350 million budget serving over 42,000 young people. Since joining the department in 2007, she has been instrumental in launching key initiatives such as the Literacy and Math School Pilot, Summer Together, and the Community Hub Initiative—efforts that earned her the 2022 San Francisco Good Government Award for supporting students and families during the COVID-19 pandemic.

With nearly three decades in youth development, Dorsey-Smith has dedicated 17 years to DCYF, previously serving as Program Specialist, Senior Program Specialist, and Chief of Staff. She has played a vital role in securing funding for essential

services and strengthening partnerships with community organizations, schools, and government agencies. As Acting Director, she continues to advance programs that expand opportunities for young people across San Francisco.

Michael D. Tubbs

ichael Tubbs, Special Advisor to California Governor Gavin Newsom for Economic Mobility, is the founder of Mayors for a Guaranteed Income and End Poverty in California (EPIC). Elected Mayor of Stockton in 2016 at just 26, he was the city's first African-American Mayor and the youngest Mayor of any major U.S. city. As Mayor, Tubbs launched the Stockton Scholars program, securing over \$20 million for scholarships and mentorships, and piloted the nation's first mayor-led guaranteed income initiative.

During his tenure, Stockton was twice named an "All-America City," saw a 40% drop in homicides, and led California in reducing officer-involved shootings. Recognized as one of the most fiscally healthy cities in the U.S., Stockton's

achievements were highlighted in the HBO documentary Stockton on My Mind. Tubbs has been honored with accolades including Fortune's Top 40 under 40, Forbes' 30 under 30 All-Star, and The Nation's "Most Valuable Mayor."

Tubbs' memoir, The Deeper The Roots: A Memoir of Hope and Home, published in 2021, details his journey from poverty to public service and his vision for empathetic leadership. A Harvard and MIT fellow, former Stockton councilmember, and educator, Tubbs is now running for California Lt. Governor in 2026, continuing his mission to uplift underserved communities.

At the age of 26, Michael D. Tubbs became the youngest Mayor of any major city in American history. As Mayor, Tubbs was lauded for his leadership and innovation. Under his stewardship, Stockton was named an "All-America City" in 2017 and 2018, saw a 40% drop in homicides in 2018 and 2019, led the state of California in the decline of officer involved shootings in 2019, was named the second most fiscally healthy city in California and one of the top most fiscally healthy cities in the nation, and was featured in an HBO documentary film, Stockton on My Mind.







He went on to earn a BFA from Carnegie Mellon University's School of Drama.



erreck, a third-generation Oaklander, was raised by a single mother in West Oakland's Acorn housing projects, one of the city's most underserved neighborhoods. With his mother working multiple jobs to provide a better life, Derreck learned the values of hard work, selflessness, and community pride. These lessons, along with the support of his extended family and community, helped him graduate high school and attend Fisk University.


After earning his degree, Derreck returned to Oakland with a mission to give back. In 2004, he opened Home of Chicken and Waffles in Jack London Square, creating a cornerstone for the local community. The restaurant not only provided delicious food but also created jobs and opportunities for Oakland residents, particularly those who had faced significant challenges.

Derreck is most proud of the fact that 70 percent of Home of Chicken and Waffles' employees have been formerly incarcerated individuals. His commitment to giving second chances has helped many people turn their lives around with some of them achieving

many people turn their lives around, with some of them achieving milestones like landing their first job, securing an apartment, or even earning a college degree.

She also serves as a Marketing Director for a healthcare company, focusing on campaigns that align with positive societal impact.



Witnessing military tanks in Bayview-Hunters Point during the 1960s shaped her activism, leading her to fight against the displacement of Black residents during San Francisco's redevelopment.

She co-founded the Bayview-Hunters Point Foundation's Alcoholism Prevention Program, led efforts against liquor store saturation, and organized the first "Women and AIDS" conference. Her advocacy helped pass San Francisco's 1995 public smoking ban, and she played a key role in workforce development and community health initiatives.

Since retiring in 2001, Carol remains active on advisory boards, mentoring young leaders and advocating for social justice. A graduate of Antioch University West, she enjoys family, cooking, travel, and music, staying guided by her faith: "Time Reveals What Destiny Holds Secret."

Del also founded Code Tenderloin, a workforce development organization that helps marginalized individuals gain tech jobs and secure stable housing.

Del holds leadership roles with organizations like Swords to Plowshares and works to ensure inclusive hiring practices across the city. His hands-on approach to helping the unhoused, formerly incarcerated, and others

in need has made him a trusted figure in the community.

Featured in national media and honored with awards such as the San Francisco Community Leadership Award, Del's life and work were chronicled in the 2024 biography Mayor of the Tenderloin. His efforts continue to transform lives and bridge the gap between the Tenderloin and the broader Bay Area community.
